# Purpose

With this Tier I advice letter, SJWC requests approval to increase revenue requirement by \$21,270,000 or 4.16% via a step rate increase attrition year of 2024 as authorized in Decision No. (D.) 22-10-005 issued on October 11, 2022. These tariffs are submitted pursuant to General Order No. 96-B and to the authority established by the California Public Utilities Commission (Commission) in D.22-10-005. Specifically Ordering Paragraph No. 5 of D.22-10-005 states:

"San Jose Water Company is authorized to update its adopted revenue requirement for Escalation Year 2023 and Escalation Year 2024 as proposed in the Amended Settlement Agreement by filing a Tier 1 Advice Letter with the Commission's Water Division on a timely basis consistent with the Rate Case Plan in Decision 07-05-062 for implementation of the applicable rate changes to become effective on January 1, 2023, and January 1, 2024, respectively."

# Rate of Return and Compliance

The Commission's Rate Case Plan requires that the requested rate increase shall be subject to the pro-forma earnings test. SJWC has attached the pro-forma Summary of Earnings as of September 30, 2023 (Attachment A) which shows that on a proforma basis, the company is currently earning 7.37% which is below the currently authorized Rate of Return of 7.47%.

SJWC has computed the 2024 escalation year revenue increase (Attachment B) using the authorized Rate of Return of 7.86%. Accordingly, SJWC has computed the 2024 escalation year using the terms set forth in D.22-10-005 and the escalation methodology per the Rate Case Plan. The escalation factors as of October 2023 published by the Public Advocates Office, and October 2023 CPI (Attachment C) were used in the escalation calculation.

Public notice via a newspaper advertisement will be completed by January 1, 2024, and confirmation will be provided upon completion.

# Rate Calculation and Average Bill Comparison

The total escalation revenue impact is \$21,270,000 or 4.16% of SJWC's authorized revenue for 2022 (Attachment B). As a result of this rate change, the bill for the average residential customer using 11 ccf per month will increase by \$4.72, or 4.14% per month.

January 1, 2024.

# Protests and Responses

Anyone may respond to or protest this advice letter. A response does not oppose the filing but presents information that may prove useful to the Commission in evaluating the advice letter. A protest objects to the advice letter in whole or in part and must set forth the specific grounds on which it is based. These grounds may include the following:

- (1) The utility did not properly serve or give notice of the advice letter;
- (2) The relief requested in the advice letter would violate statute or Commission order, or is not authorized by statute or Commission order on which the utility relies;
- (3) The analysis, calculations, or data in the advice letter contain material error or omissions;
- (4) The relief requested in the advice letter is pending before the Commission in a formal proceeding;

- (5) The relief requested in the advice letter requires consideration in a formal hearing, or is otherwise inappropriate for the advice letter process; or
- (6) The relief requested in the advice letter is unjust, unreasonable, or discriminatory (provided that such a protest may not be made where it would require relitigating a prior order of the Commission).

A response or protest must be made by electronic mail and must be received by the Water Division within 20 days of the date this advice letter is filed. The address for delivering a protest is:

The advice letter process does not provide for any responses, protests or comments, except for the utility's reply, after the 20-day comment period.

In compliance with Paragraph 4.3 of General Order 96-B, a copy of this advice letter has been sent via electronic mail to all interested and affected parties as detailed in Attachment E.

SJWC currently has Advice Letters 600, 602, 603, and 604 pending before the Commission.

This filing will not cause the withdrawal of service, nor conflict with other schedules or rules.

If a distribution main of adequate size to serve a private fire protection system, in addition to all other normal service, does not exist in the street or alley adjacent to the premises to be served, then a service main from the nearest existing main of adequate capacity shall then be installed by the utility and the cost paid by applicant. Such payment shall not be subject to refund.
- 3. Service hereunder is for private fire protection systems to which no connections for other than fire protection purposes are allowed and which are regularly inspected by the underwriters having jurisdiction, are installed according to specifications of the utility, and are maintained to the satisfaction of the utility. The utility may install the standard detector type meter approved by the Board of Fire Underwriters for protection against theft, leakage or waste of water and the cost paid by the applicant. Such payment shall not be subject to refund.

The following data are provided to Commission water utilities staff to enable them to utilize Public Advocates Office composite non-labor escalation methodology. The numbers are to be used in conjunction with the non-labor factors provided in Public Advocates Office monthly escalation memorandum to bring historic dollars to base year dollars and to inflate recorded dollars to test year levels. The annual change in Compensation per Hour is applicable to contracted services, while the non-labor factor is related to material and supply purchases. In accordance with a 1991 agreement between the CPUC Water Division and the California Water Association (CWA), the monthly non-labor rate is to be weighted by 60 percent and the Compensation per Hour Index weighted 40 percent. The purpose of the monthly Escalation Memorandum is to inform division management of the trends in the general price level of utility non-labor expenses and wage contracts. Data are provided for 13 years, which include eight historic years, the estimated current year, and four forecasted years.

The following table summarizes the major changes in forecasted labor and non-labor inflation for years 2023 through 2027. Data for 2022 are provided as benchmarks. The factors for July 2023 are presented for comparison.

These escalation rates represent the calendar year average, or alternatively stated, the 12-monthended spot rate at mid-year. These price factors have not been adjusted for real growth of expensed materials and services. The escalation factors are generated from a composite index of 10 Wholesale Price Indexes (WPI) for materials and supplies expenses and the CPI-U weighted 5% for services and consumer-related items. **These non-labor rates are <u>not applicable to</u> plant, contracted services, loans, insurance, rents, and pensions and other utility employee benefits. Escalation of these expenses is addressed on pages 10-15 of D.04-06-018/R.03-09-005 (Water Rate Case Plan).**

CONSUMER PRICE INDEX - OCTOBER 2023

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) was unchanged in October on a seasonally adjusted basis, after increasing 0.4 percent in September, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. Over the last 12 months, the all items index increased 3.2 percent before seasonal adjustment.

The index for shelter continued to rise in October, offsetting a decline in the gasoline index and resulting in the seasonally adjusted index being unchanged over the month. The energy index fell 2.5 percent over the month as a 5.0-percent decline in the gasoline index more than offset increases in other energy component indexes. The food index increased 0.3 percent in October, after rising 0.2 percent in September. The index for food at home increased 0.3 percent over the month while the index for food away from home rose 0.4 percent.

The index for all items less food and energy rose 0.2 percent in October, after rising 0.3 percent in September. Indexes which increased in October include rent, owners' equivalent rent, motor vehicle insurance, medical care, recreation, and personal care. The indexes for lodging away from home, used cars and trucks, communication, and airline fares were among those that decreased over the month.

The all items index rose 3.2 percent for the 12 months ending October, a smaller increase than the 3.7-percent increase for the 12 months ending September. The all items less food and energy index rose 4.0 percent over the last 12 months, its smallest 12-month change since the period ending in September 2021. The energy index decreased 4.5 percent for the 12 months ending October, and the food index increased 3.3 percent over the last year.
